#### What is the Innovation Café?

- Based on the World Café model
  - www.worldcafe.org
- A shared conversational experience
- The format:
  - Three sections Red, Blue, Green
  - Three questions
  - Sit, draw, exchange ideas and conversation





People already have within them the wisdom and creativity to confront even the most difficult challenges. Given the appropriate context and focus, it is possible to access and use this deeper knowledge about what's important.

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- There are 3 rounds of conversation of approximately 15-20 minutes each.
- Explore Questions or issues that genuinely matter to our government environment, community, and future.
- You are encouraged to write, doodle and draw key ideas on their tablecloths or on nearby easels.
- Upon completing the initial round of conversation, your table host will remain at the table while others travel as "ambassadors of meaning." The travelers (you) carry key ideas, themes and questions into the new conversations.
- Table host will welcome the new guests and briefly share the main ideas, themes and questions of the initial conversation. **Link and connect ideas** coming from your previous table conversations—listen carefully and build on each other's contributions.
- By providing opportunities for people to move in several rounds of conversation, ideas, questions, and themes begin to link and connect. At the end of the second round, all of the tables or conversation clusters in the room will be *cross-pollinated* with insights from prior conversations.
- After several rounds of conversation, there will be a period of sharing discoveries and insights in a **whole group conversation**. It is in these town meeting-style conversations that patterns can be identified, collective knowledge grows, and possibilities for action to emerge.

- Listen together for insights and deeper questions.
